

Located in City of Parksville, opened in 2003, borrowing debt to build, retired in 2023

- 2 NHL (Howie Meeker and Victor Kraatz) regular size ice sheets
- Total capacity 1367 with seating for 950 (Meeker) and 250 (Kraatz)
- Multipurpose rooms (2)
- Large usable lobby space available for event use
- Ice and dry floor rentals
- Meeting room
- Skate sharpening and rental shop
- Elevator and accessible seating
- Concession
- Main office and administration for Recreation Services.
- Accessible by RDN Transit






RDN PARKS REQUIRE DOGS TO BE ON-LEASH

In most RDN parks dogs can be off-leash if they are under control.


