Sense of Place What the Community Said

Surroundings allow us to live in harmony with nature

Educate, reinforce and preserve local history

Enhance signage of historical/ ecological sites

Knowing your neighbours

Preserve small community feel

Sense of community

Sense of Place What the Community Said

Strong farming

Sustaining water – river, oceans – lakes, aquifer

Ability to live and work in the community

Self-sufficiency

Sustainable logging

Regulate the size of property and number of houses per lot to sustain rural community feel.

Maintain functioning rural landscapes

Sense of Place What the Community Said

Safe place founded on the knowledge that individuals are cared for

Protect and keep local schools to give children a sense of place

Parks playground

Venues for youth and seniors

No widening highways

Build safe sidewalks to maintain a healthy community

Draft Principles – Sense of Place

- 1. Preserve local history and rural character.
- 2. Maintain functioning rural landscapes.

Complexity What the Community Said

Harmony and balance whilst meeting shared needs.

Model human communities on the complexity and diversity of the whole.

Decisions need to consider unexpected and or unintended effects.

Recognize nature's unpredictability, and prepare for natural disasters.

Future planning must consider the complexity of the impact of peak oil and climate change and thereby plan for a changing paradigm (more personal food production, alternative transportation to car, etc.).

Our ecosystems are stable when diverse and complex.

Adapt to nature's complexity, diversity, and unpredictability

Complexity What the Community Said

Triple bottom line accounting

Economic, social and environmental factors are interdependent and must be considered together.

Responsible evaluation of all factors by criteria (standards) independent of any one group's interests.

Agriculture and forestry need encouragement. They need access to the <u>best</u> market. Controlled growth allowing for preservation of the environment and the rural nature of the area outside of the village.

Economic, social, and environmental factors are interdependent and must be considered together.

Complexity What the Community Said

Future generations will be affected by our actions.

How sustainable is our current situation?

Future generations will need to be self-sustaining

Consider the needs of future generations in today's decisions

- 1. Adapt to nature's complexity, diversity, and unpredictability.
- 2. Economic, social, and environmental factors are interdependent and must be considered together.
- 3. Consider the needs of future generations in today's decisions.

Equity What the Community Said

Recognize that the community includes all levels of economic diversity when making decisions on community planning.

Young people – opportunity to put down roots.

Residents interests to be given at least as much weight as developers

Keeping our children in Cedar – keeping it affordable for them to live here.

Recognize the diverse income levels that exist in electoral Area A when making decisions. There is very low to medium to high incomes all within the community.

Include all levels of economic diversity in community planning

Respect the community's diversity

Equity What the Community Said

Alternative transportation options to be given equal status

Paved road shoulders

Develop walking and biking trails

Provide more liveable space in areas that are not farm land

Develop a safe healthy community for all residents

Incorporate rigorous precautionary principles in the OCP/ RGS

Seriously recognizing the wealth of nature i.e. make the environment as important as the economy

Maintain the UCB to reflect the ecosystems and habitat that provide

Allow the free flow of water systems

Nature has intrinsic value

Participation What the Community Said

Develop an open communication between the RDN and the local community.

Participation What the Community Said

Full participation can only be accomplished if all involved are in possession of all the facts – i.e. no hidden agendas

Process must be recorded and auditable to the OCP outcome.

Provide full information to the public before decisions are made.

Community Vision


Brings citizens together to develop a shared image of what they want their community to become.














Community Visioning

- Compare across 2 tables




