

### The Fire Ban on Category 1 (Campfires) is Being Lifted at Noon on May 15

Effective May 15, 2026, at noon, the BC Wildfire Service lifted the ban on [Category 1](#) campfires under the Coastal Fire Centre's jurisdiction. Although BC Wildfire Service has changed the category 1 campfire prohibition, this does not apply to all areas. To see if this applies to your area, please contact your local fire department for the latest information.

A category 1 campfire, as defined in the [Wildfire Regulation](#), refers to any fire that is:

- No larger than 0.5 metres high by 0.5 metres wide
- Used for recreational purposes or by a First Nation for ceremonial purposes

While the ban has been lifted, the public is reminded to follow some basic campfire safety rules, including:

- Check the current and forecast weather conditions. If it's windy or wind is in the forecast, don't burn.
- Choose a location on level ground that is a safe distance from tent walls, shrubs, trees, other flammable materials and away from low hanging branches.
- Contain the fire with a non-flammable barrier and never leave it unattended.
- Have at least one firefighting hand tool such as a shovel or fire extinguisher, or 8 litres of water on hand to extinguish the fire.
- Before you leave the area or go to bed for the night, your fire must be fully extinguished, and the ashes cool to the touch.

[Category 2](#) open fires and [Category 3](#) open fires continue to be prohibited during the provincial ban. The following activities and use of equipment, materials and substances are also prohibited during the ban:

- Fireworks as defined in the *Fireworks Act*
- Binary exploding targets
- Sky Lanterns
- Wood fired hot tubs, wood fired pizza ovens and other wood fired devices unless vented through a structure that has a flue and is incorporated in a building
- Burn barrels or burn cages of any size or description
- Controlled air incinerators
- Air curtain burners
- Carbonizers

These bans apply to all public and private land and are in place until October 31, 2026, or until the order is rescinded by BC Wildfire Service to help reduce human-caused wildfires and for public safety.
