Community Cleanup Guide





How Can I Get **Tipping Fees Waived?**

If you are cleaning up your community, whether you are a group of one or one hundred, you can apply to have your fees waived.

Eligibility requirements

- The cleanup area must be located on public property within the jurisdiction of the Regional District of Nanaimo. This may include natural areas, recreational outdoor spaces, parks, beaches, bodies of water and near waterways. This does not include private property.
- The cleanup is conducted by volunteer(s) on behalf of a group or non-profit.
- The material is sorted and recycled to its maximum potential recyclables will not be accepted for landfilling. (See page 4-5 and the appendix for the recycling materials that can be dropped off for free at participating depots.)
- The email application must be approved. The required email outline is seen below. In response, you will receive a waiver that can be presented at the facility scale house.

If you meet the eligibility criteria, staff will require at least one weeks notice to prepare facility staff and create the waiver. To apply for a tipping fee waiver, email the RDN at zerowaste@rdn.bc.ca, Re: Community Cleanup. Your email must include the following:

Please allow up to two weeks to process this application.

Once the application is approved, staff will provide a waiver that can be displayed to facility staff upon arrival at the scale house.

Steps to Organizing a Cleanup Event

Before the event

- Plan your cleanup set up a date and time.
- Email RDN for approval. When you get your tipping fee waiver approval email, make sure to save it on your phone or print a copy to provide to the scale house.
- Gather your supplies:
 - □ First aid kit
 - □ Signage for sorting materials found here, rdn.bc.ca/community-cleanup and is included in the appendix of this guide.
- Suggested cleanup equipment:
 - □ Containers or bags for sorting different materials
 - □ Bags for individuals to collect material
 - □ Sharps container
 - Pickers/tongs
 - Personal Protective Equipment (PPE)
 - □ Safety footwear, gloves and eyewear

During the cleanup

- Set up a station for supplies.
- Brief participants on how materials are sorted and which containers they should be sorted into.
- Use the signage in the appendix of this guide to set up recycling stations.
- Leave no trace don't trample vegetation or leave any waste from the event itself.

After the event

- Thank your volunteers.
- Take the material that you separated out to a local depot for recycling.
- When arriving at the Church Road Transfer Station or Regional Landfill, be sure to have your waiver ready for the scale attendant.
- Provide photos of the materials collected, indicating where the cleanup occurred to zerowaste@rdn.bc.ca.
- Feel free to share photos of your group in action, so we can show your efforts in our newsletter or online!





Visit the cleanup area to identify any dangerous conditions and assess the types and volumes of the material.





Included in the appendix of this guide is signage for the different EPR programs in BC.

Use the signage at your collection events to help separate out material that can be taken to a depot instead of bringing it to the landfill.

Recycling Materials From Your Cleanup

Why are some materials acceptable to recycle while others are not?

The majority of materials accepted at depots are part of an Extended Producer Responsibility (EPR) program. EPR requires product producers to claim responsibility for the life cycle of their products, including end of life management. By requiring products to be reused, recycled, or responsibly disposed of, EPR reduces the environmental toll on our planet.

The following is a list of some of the EPR programs in BC with examples of their products. These items, and similar products can be recycled at participating depots at no cost. More detailed information about what these programs accept can be found in the appendix of this guide.

Hazardous Recyclables

- **Fire hazards:** Be sure to separate the following materials from both garbage and recycling: batteries, aerosol containers, fluorescent tubes, compact fluorescent lamps, helium and propane tanks.
- **Sharps disposal:** Island Health provides steps on how to dispose of sharps safely, including a map of drop off locations through the RDN, islandhealth.ca/safe-needle-disposal.





Hazardous Materials

Any material suspected of being hazardous but that cannot be identified should remain on-site until proper collection and disposal is arranged. If you encounter potentially hazardous materials during your cleanup, please contact zerowaste@rdn.bc.ca.

Priority Invasive Plants

The priority invasive plants which are currently identified for management through controlled landfilling are:

- Giant Hogweed (*Heracleum mantegazzianum*)
- Garlic Mustard (Alliaria petiolata)
- Invasive Knotweeds (Fallopia x / Polygonum polystachum)
- Spotted Knapweed (Centaurea maculosa)
- Wild Chervil (Anthriscus sylvestris)
- Poison Hemlock (Conium maculatum)

Japanese Knotweed

- Heart-shaped leaves
- Clusters of white flowers

When disposing of invasive plants, they must be double bagged and disposed at the Regional Landfill as controlled waste.

Drywall and Asbestos Disposal

Many construction materials produced contain asbestos. It can be found in vermiculite, insulations, pipe wrap and boiler insulation, cement pipe, textured ceilings, wallboard and siding, flooring (adhesives), drywall mud/joint filler, roofing shingles, artificial fire logs, gaskets and a wide range of other materials.

These materials can be hazardous as they deteriorate or if they are disturbed, particles can stay in the air for hours, posing serious lung problems including lung disease or cancer. Precautionary measures are recommended, such as utilizing a qualified professional to identify asbestos.

If you will be disposing of asbestos-containing material:

- **Transport** ensure that the load is covered and secured to reduce litter on roadways.

Prohibited Materials

Items that are not accepted at the Church Road Transfer Station and the Regional Landfill include:

- Hazardous waste
- Biomedical waste
- Clean soil
- Land clearing waste
- Liquids
- Motor vehicle bodies and farm implements
- Recyclable material delivered in roll-off bins or volume greater than 3 cubic meters

Before you leave – make an appointment at the Regional Landfill at, 250-722-2044 extension 3221.

Packaging – double bag the material in 6 mil poly asbestos bags. Bags must be goose-neck tied and sealed with duct tape. Bags are available at safety supply stores or RDN Solid Waste Facilities (\$2/bag).
